Why ARZA is Running This Campaign?

Darchei Noam, an Israeli Reform congregation, has been building an active communal Jewish life for 25 years. They are strong, vibrant, and looking for partners to help them take the next step in their growth.

An IMPJ (Israel Movement for Progressive Judaism) congregation, Darchei Noam serves the towns of Ramat HaSharon and Herzliya as well as the northern neighborhoods of Tel-Aviv. It is an area of largely “secular Jews” who are missing a synagogue that meets their needs.

Secular is a relative term in Israel. Recent research has borne out that most “Secular” Jews observe the holidays, light Sabbath candles, want their children to learn about their Jewish heritage, and celebrate life cycle events as Jews.

But they want their synagogue participation to be in a synagogue, not a borrowed space. The government funds Orthodox congregational buildings, but the vast numbers of people in the area do not feel at home in those congregations. If we want to see an inclusive, pluralistic, rich Jewish life in Israel, we will have to help build it. Come; help us build an Israel that is for all Jews!



What ARZA and Darchei Noam are Trying to Accomplish, With Your Help

The congregation now has 400 members who participate in services, learning, social action and many other events throughout the year. All these activities currently take place in a local high school auditorium! As a result of the lack of proper facilities, Darchei Noam has not been able to fully develop its potential within the community, nor even to meet the needs of its existing congregants. If we want to see pluralistic, rich Jewish life in Israel, we are going to have to help.

Congregants and their families have done what no other Reform congregation has done before in Israel. Their own internal fundraising provided the initial \$750,000 toward a new permanent home for Darchei Noam. The funds have been used to secure the land and the cost of the initial phase of building. A shell exists which is used for services in good weather, but the city requires that more work be done towards their Certificate of Occupancy (plumbing, wiring, finishing walls, floors etc) or they risk losing their land and permission to build. All that they have accomplished could be lost.

\$2,000,000 is needed to successfully complete the new facility for Darchei Noam. ARZA is committed to raising these funds with your help. By giving to this campaign, you can be part of building a rich, pluralistic Jewish society in Israel.

Who is ARZA Running This Campaign for?

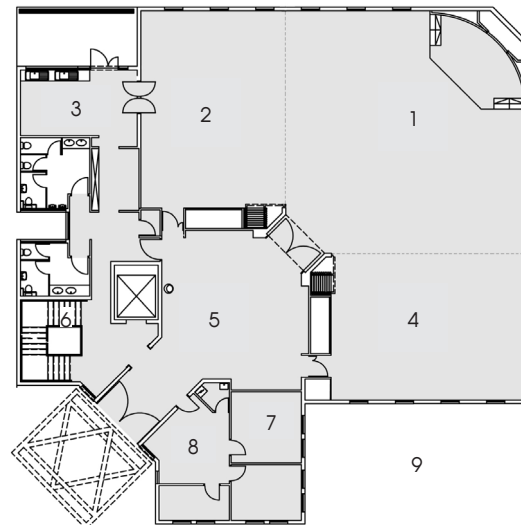
